Introduction to the Scripture Readings:

Wisdom 7:7-11 — A reflection on the gift of wisdom, presented as the greatest gift anyone could receive.

Hebrews 4:12-13 — God's word is powerful, it cuts through us and exposes what is wrong.

Mark 10:17-30 — The 'rich young man' seeks a simple way of entering heaven, since money is no problem to him. Jesus tells him money itself is a problem, but then reassures that God can save all, whatever their wealth.

Next Sunday is **World Mission Sunday**. We are called to be part of the Church's missionary efforts, supporting missionary priests, religious sisters and brothers, and lay catechists who provide loving service to those most in need. They play a crucial part in "going and inviting everyone to the banquet". As Catholics around the world(here at home and in the missions) gather at the Eucharist around the table of the Lord, let us pray for the Church's missionary work and offer our support to Missio Scotland for our brothers and sisters throughout the world. The special collection next weekend will be for the Pontifical Mission Societies – the Pope's official charity for oversees mission

The **Lectionary**, the book that contains the Scripture readings for Mass and the Sacraments, is changing as part of the continuing process of revising liturgical translations. The process began with the Roman Missal in 2011 and has continued with all the other liturgical texts. The new Lectionary will use the *English Standard Version - Catholic Edition* of the Bible and the *Abbey Psalter* and will be used from the first Sunday of Advent 2024. The changes are intended to make the biblical translations more faithful to the original languages, biblical scholarship, and to provide a text for use in liturgical setting.

After long and scholarly discussions, it was last year the Bishops approved the translation of the bible to be used in Catholic Churches. For over fifty years we have been using the *Jerusalem Translation*, so what has become very familiar will sound a little different from Advent 2024.

This means we have to buy news books, £640 a set, which have to be of good quality, a high standard and durable as they contain the Word of God and will be used everyday at Holy Mass.

At the **parish social night** held recently, £760 was raised from ticket sales, raffle and donations. Thank you to all who contributed in any way.
