Scripture Readings:

Micah 5:1-4 The promise is given that Bethlehem will be the birthplace of the shepherd of Israel. *Hebrews 10:5-10* Instead of offering sacrifices, Jesus offers himself, dedicating himself to do God's will —a model for all believers.

Luke 1:39-44 Blessed is Mary among women, and blessed is the fruit of her womb – Jesus, whose birth we will shortly celebrate.

Jubilee Year: Pope Francis has given the 2025 Jubilee Year the theme of "Pilgrims of Hope". Pope Francis has invited Catholics to renew our hope and discover a vision that can restore access to the fruits of the earth to everyone. We are also invited to rediscover a spirituality of God's creation in which we understand ourselves as pilgrims on the earth rather than masters of the world.

The Jubilee Year begins on Christmas Eve 2024 and concludes on 6th January, 2026. In the Catholic Church, a Jubilee or Holy year is a special year of forgiveness and reconciliation, in which people are invited to come back into right relationship with God, with one another, and with all of creation. A Jubilee Year is celebrated by the Church every twenty-five years. This has been the case since 1470, when Pope Paul II changed it from every fifty years. The word Jubilee comes from the Hebrew word "yobel", which is a ram's horn. This wind instrument is blown to mark the start of a Jubilee Year in the Bible (Leviticus 25:9).

There will be a **Christmas church cleaning** at 7pm on Monday, 23rd December if anyone is free to help. This will be followed by a cup of tea/coffee and a mince pie in the parish house. Thank you to the volunteers who come along without ceremony to clean the church throughout the year.

As usual, there will be **Midnight Mass** in the parish preceded by Carols at 11.30pm and Mass on **Christmas Day** at 10 am. Looking ahead to New Year, there will be Mass on **New Year's Eve** at 10.00pm followed by a very informal gathering in the hall for those parishioners who want to come together to bring in the New Year. Bring along a wee plate of snacks if you wish to share with others and bring along a wee bottle to share too, if you wish. To have an idea of numbers, please sign your name on the sheet at the back of the church if you intend coming along. Mass will also be celebrated on **New Years Day** (Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God) at 12 noon.

There will be an **open parish meeting** in the church hall on Wednesday, 15th January at 7pm with Fr. Roddy, Brenda Reid (acting Head of St. Mun's Primary School) and Fr. Ronald Campbell (R.E. Advisor and Director of R.E.) who will each give a short presentation with a view to looking at what we can do for our young parishioners and how we can support parents in handing on the faith to their children. This is something that

should concern all parishioners. The youth are not only the future of the church but they are also the church now. All parishioners welcome.

of resources, your overcrowded lodging, your unlit night sky, your humble surroundings.
