Scripture Readings:

Acts 5:12-16 — During the Easter season this year, the first reading each Sunday is from the Acts of the Apostles and the second reading is from Apocalypse, the last book of the Bible. Today's excerpt from Acts describes the courage of the first disciples, who were bold enough to meet in the Temple precincts and carry on the healing work of Jesus.

Apocalypse 1:9-13 — John introduces his vision, which he wrote to encourage Christians who were being persecuted.

John 20:19-31 — Jesus appears on the evening of his resurrection, and helps those who doubt to believe.

In the Jubilee year of 2000, Pope John Paul 2nd, proclaimed that from that year forward, the second Sunday of Easter would be celebrated as **Divine Mercy Sunday**. This was proclaimed at the Canonization Mass of St. Faustina Kawalska, who worked throughout her life to make all people aware of the merciful love of God. Sr. Faustina was born and raised in Poland. Following a vocation to the religious life, she joined the Congregation of the Sisters of Our Lady of Mercy. As a member of the Congregation, she worked as a cook, gardener and porter. Her contemplation on the mercy of God led her to develop a childlike trust in God and deep love for her neighbour.

Not only will this bring us in line with all the parishes in the Diocese, but it will also bring more people together under one roof. New rotas for Readers and Eucharistic Ministers have been made up.

The **Liturgy Works** weekends will resume again on 19th until 21st September in the Conforti Institute, Coatbridge. This is a weekend of liturgy-themed workshops, spiritual talks, liturgical singing, prayer and get together with people from around the parishes of Argyll and the Isles. Reflection on Pope Francis

"One of my favourite images of Pope Francis is of him washing the feet of some of the women in the Rabbaba prison in Rome on Holy Thursday, 2024. It was very moving. Pope Francis washed and kissed their feet and looked up at them with a friendly smile. Most of the women prisoners were in tears. My first thought was that the Pope's simple gesture of kindness and love would remain with those women for the rest of their lives and who knows from that day on their lives might be transformed.

Pope Francis captivated the world with his humanity. He so often drew our attention and the attention of the world to the core issues of a Gospel faith: care of the poor, mercy not fear of a loving God, simplicity of lifestyle, the giftedness of every person. He had a special place for migrants! It was his personal choice to carry his own bag. He swapped the gift of a stunning Lamborghini for a modest Fiat. He chose not to live in the papal palace. He wasn't afraid to step out on his own.

In 2015 Pope Francis produced a Papal encyclical called, "Laudato Si" on the environment and climate change which was a groundbreaking document. His voice was a strong and clear one for making the changes necessary for the future of the planet. He had his critics and enemies and he carried a heavy cross. At the same time he was cheerful, he had a good sense of humour and he smiled a lot! I am full of gratitude for the journey we have had with him and I am grateful for all that he has shared with us on his journey.

A final quote from Pope Francis which will always remain close to my heart, is "I see clearly that the thing the Church needs most today is the ability to heal wounds and to warm the hearts of the Faithful.....I see the church as a field hospital after battle".

May Pope Francis rest in peace and rise in glory".
