Scripture Readings:

Zephaniah 2:3, 3:12-13 — Zephaniah describes the kind of people who find favour with God.

1 Corinthians 1:26-31 — Paul reminds us that we are to rely not on our own efforts, but on God's power.

Matthew 5:1-12 — Today we begin to read from a section in Matthew's Gospel which describes the Sermon on the Mount.

An easily recognisable feature of **Matthew's gospel** is Jesus' authentic teaching. Matthew presents five blocks of teaching, and this is the first extract from the first and most famous of these: the Sermon on the Mount. Moses had climbed Mount Sinai to receive God's Law, God's teaching. Jesus climbs this Galilean mountain (hill) to teach the true meaning of God's law. Through the beatitudes in today's gospel, he summarises to whom the kingdom of God belongs.

Reflection:

“When the Russian- Finnish boundary line was being redrawn, a farmer was told that the border passed right through the middle of his land. He therefore had the option of having his land taken into Russia or Finland. He promised to give the matter serious thought, and after some weeks announced that he wanted to live in Finland. A host of incensed Russian officials descended on him to explain the advantages of belonging to Russia, not Finland.
